Camp Curtin Jan 17 1862

Dear Wife

This is the last time that I
will write to you from camp Curtin
yesterday our Regiment was by agreement
consolidated with the 58 Regt. of P.V.
encamped at Camp Roxbury near
Philadelphia. J. Richter goes
is the Col. and Col. Curtis takes the
position of Lieutenant Col.
S. Holmes, Adjutant, E. Holmes Wagon
master, C. D. Webster Sergeant Major or
something better & Dr. March has
hospital Steward, and the Col wants
to give him something better if he
can find a place.

Our Regt marched
out of camp Curtin this morning
at 9 o'clock & took the cars for Phila.
The boys went off in good spirits
all feeling well. Myself C. D. Webster
E. Holmes Wagon Master were detailed to
remain to take care of the Curtin
Master's store & take an Invoice
